Northwest Pipeline, LLC; Notice of Scoping Period Requesting Comments on Environmental Issues for the Proposed Wild Trail Project

The staff of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC or Commission) will prepare an environmental document that will discuss the environmental impacts of the Wild Trail Project involving construction and operation of facilities by Northwest Pipeline, LLC (Northwest) in Daggett County, Utah. The Commission will use this environmental document in its decision-making process to determine whether the project is in the public convenience and necessity.

This notice announces the opening of the scoping process the Commission will use to gather input from the public and interested agencies regarding the project. As part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) review process, the Commission takes into account concerns the public may have about proposals and the environmental impacts that could result from its action whenever it considers the issuance of a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity. This gathering of public input is referred to as “scoping.” The main goal of the scoping process is to focus the analysis in the environmental document on the important environmental issues. Additional information about the Commission’s NEPA process is described below in the *NEPA Process and Environmental Document* section of this notice.

By this notice, the Commission requests public comments on the scope of issues to address in the environmental document. To ensure that your comments are timely and properly recorded, please submit your comments so that the Commission receives them in Washington, DC on or before 5:00 p.m. Eastern Time on August 8, 2025. Comments may be submitted in written form. Further details on how to submit comments are provided in the *Public Participation* section of this notice.

Your comments should focus on the potential environmental effects, reasonable alternatives, and measures to avoid or lessen environmental impacts. Your input will help the Commission staff determine what issues they need to evaluate in the environmental document. Commission staff will consider all written comments during the preparation of the environmental document.

If you submitted comments on this project to the Commission before the opening of this docket on May 21, 2025, you will need to file those comments in Docket No. CP25–497–000 to ensure they are considered as part of this proceeding.

This notice is being sent to the Commission’s current environmental mailing list for this project. State and local government representatives should notify their constituents of this proposed project and encourage them to comment on their areas of concern.

Northwest provided landowners with a fact sheet prepared by the FERC entitled “An Interstate Natural Gas Facility On My Land? What Do I Need To Know?” which addresses typically asked questions, including the use of eminent domain and how to participate in the Commission’s proceedings. Summary of the Proposed Project

Northwest proposes to construct and operate the Daggett Compressor Station, adjacent to the existing Clay Basin Meter Station in Daggett County, Utah. The Wild Trail Project would provide an additional 57,955 dekatherms a day of northbound firm transportation service from the existing Wild Horse

Receipt Point to the Kern River Muddy Creek Delivery Point.

The Wild Trail Project would consist of the following facilities:

- the greenfield Daggett Compressor Station, adjacent to existing Clay Basin Meter Station. The compressor station would consist of one unit scrubber, a station power distribution building, unitized power buildings, 500-kilowatt emergency generator, oily water sump tank and pump, engine/compressor lube oil storage, hydrocarbon liquid storage, and a new instrument air package with receiver and other items;
- the addition of one low nitrogen oxides (NO_x)-emitting gas-fired turbine driven compressor unit with 11,110 nominal horsepower;
- installation of 24-inch-diameter suction and discharge yard piping to interconnect the Daggett Compressor Station to Northwest's existing 26-inch-diameter Northwest Pipeline;
- installation of a 140-foot communication tower; and
- minor modifications to the existing Clay Basin Meter Station.

The general location of the project facilities is shown in appendix 1.¹

Land Requirements for Construction

Construction of the proposed facilities would occur immediately adjacent to the existing Clay Basin Meter Station and would require approximately 20.25 acres of land. The 20.25 acres includes 15.86 acres that encompasses the proposed Daggett Compressor Station located on land managed by the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, as well as approximately 4.39 acres of temporary workspace located within the Ashley National Forest, managed by the U.S. Forest Service. Following construction, the 4.39 acres of U.S. Forest Service land would be restored to pre-construction conditions, as well as the 9.09 acres of construction workspace areas, leaving 6.77 acres of land converted to natural gas use for the Daggett Compressor Station.

NEPA Process and the Environmental Document

Any environmental document issued by the Commission will discuss impacts that could occur as a result of the construction and operation of the proposed project under the relevant general resource areas:

- geology and soils;
- water resources and wetlands;
- vegetation and wildlife;
- threatened and endangered species;
- cultural resources;
- land use;
- socioeconomic;
- air quality and noise; and
- reliability and safety.

Commission staff will also evaluate reasonable alternatives to the proposed project or portions of the project and make recommendations on how to lessen or avoid impacts on the various resource areas. Your comments will help Commission staff identify and focus on the issues that might have an effect on the human environment and potentially eliminate others from further study and discussion in the environmental document.

Following this scoping period, Commission staff will determine whether to prepare an Environmental Assessment (EA) or an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The EA or the EIS will present Commission staff's independent analysis of the issues. If Commission staff prepares an EA, a *Notice of Schedule for the Preparation of an Environmental Assessment* will be issued. The EA may be issued for an allotted public comment period. The Commission would consider timely comments on the EA before making its decision regarding the proposed project. If Commission staff prepares an EIS, a *Notice of Intent to Prepare an EIS/ Notice of Schedule* will be issued, which will open up an additional comment period. Staff will then prepare a draft EIS which will be issued for public comment. Commission staff will consider all timely comments received during the comment period on the draft EIS and revise the document, as necessary, before issuing a final EIS. Any EA or draft and final EIS will be available in electronic format in the public record through eLibrary² and the Commission's natural gas environmental documents web page (<https://www.ferc.gov/industries-data/natural-gas/environmental-environmental-documents>). If eSubscribed, you will receive instant email notification when the environmental document is issued.

With this notice, the Commission is asking agencies with jurisdiction by law and/or special expertise with respect to the environmental issues of this project to formally cooperate in the preparation of the environmental document.³

Agencies that would like to request cooperating agency status should follow the instructions for filing comments provided under the *Public Participation* section of this notice. Currently, the BLM and U.S. Forest Service have agreed to participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the environmental document to satisfy their NEPA responsibilities related to this project. The BLM states that it will use the EA to disclose and analyze the environmental consequences of the proposed action to support consideration of issuing of a right-of-way for the Wild Trail Compressor Facility as proposed by Northwest. The purpose and need for BLM action under Section 28 of the Mineral Leasing Act of 1920, as amended (30 United States Code 195), is to review and provide a decision for the right-of-way application.

Consultation Under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act

In accordance with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's implementing regulations for section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, the Commission is using this notice to initiate consultation with the Utah State Historic Preservation Office, and to solicit their views and those of other government agencies, interested Indian tribes, and the public on the project's potential effects on historic properties.⁴ The environmental document for this project will document findings on the impacts on historic properties and summarize the status of consultations under section 106.

Environmental Mailing List

The environmental mailing list includes federal, state, and local government representatives and agencies; elected officials; environmental and public interest groups; Native American Tribes; other interested parties; and local libraries and newspapers. This list also includes all affected landowners (as defined in the Commission's regulations) who are potential right-of-way grantors, whose property may be used temporarily for project purposes, or who own homes within certain distances of aboveground facilities, and anyone who submits comments on the project and includes a mailing address with their comments.
